



What is a Metropolitan Planning Organization?

A Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is an agency created by federal law to provide local direction for urban transportation planning and the allocation of federal transportation funds to cities with populations greater than 50,000.

There are about 400 MPOs across the country. While most MPOs are part of a city, county or council of governments, the Alamo Area MPO is an independent agency.




Purpose of a Metropolitan Planning Organization?

An MPO is needed to facilitate collaboration of governments, interested parties, and residents in the planning process.

In other words, the federal government wished to see federal transportation funds spent in a manner that has a basis in metropolitan region-wide plans developed through intergovernmental collaboration, rational analysis, and consensus-based decision makes.



Proposition 7 Funding – Beginning FY2018, sales and use tax & elimination of diversions

Federal gas tax placed in Highway Trust Fund


Unchanged since 1993

Since 2008 supplemented with Federal General Funds.

Texas is a "donor" state, only recoups 95%

The 5% exceeds \$700M

State Highway Fund - SHF



The SHF main account receives the following revenues:

- State Motor Fuels Tax*
- Vehicle Registration Fees*
- Other revenues, such as lubricant sales taxes*, permit fees for special vehicles, fees, and interest* on certain funds
- Local project participation funds

*Indicates revenues that are dedicated by the Texas Constitution to fund public roadway projects.



Roadway Improvement Projects for the San Antonio – Bexar Metropolitan Planning Organization as Recommended by the Comal County Commissioners Court November 21, 2013

Projects Recommended:

1. FM 306

a) Improve between MKT Railroad crossing to River Chase Way to 4 lanes with left/right turn lanes and signalization at all major roadway intersections.

2. LOOP 337


a) Improve between IH35 and SH46 to a divided 4 lanes roadway with left/right turn lanes and signalization at all major roadway intersections.

3. <u>SH46</u>

a) Improve the portions within the City Limits of Bulverde to a divided 4-6 lane roadway with left/right turn lanes and signalization at all major roadway intersections.

4. FM 2252

a) Improve between the Bexar County line and FM 3009 to 4 lanes with left/right turn lanes and signalization at all major roadway intersections.









Projects submitted for STP-MM Funding Consideration Sorted by Technical Score from highest to lowest


Projects submitted for STP-MM Funding Consideration Sorted by Public Meeting Input from highest to lowest





Projects submitted for STP-MM Funding Consideration Sorted by Technical Score from highest to lowest


